REFLECTION Repentance and the Barren Fig Tree Parable: Interpretations

Traditional Interpretation: The Church Fathers (and the Catholic Church subsequently) have interpreted this parable as Jesus Christ warning Christians that they must bear fruits after their conversion worthy of repentance or risk being condemned to Hell. God, in His mercy, repeatedly checks on believers to see if they have borne fruit worthy of their baptism and conversion. If someone who has been baptized and says they are Christian has not borne fruit, they are condemned. This verse was used during the Counter-Reformation to help support the belief of the Church that faith without works is dead.

Holistic Interpretation: The owner, who had a fig tree planted in his vineyard and came seeking fruit, is generally regarded as representing God the Father. The gardener (vinedresser) is Jesus. Fig trees were common and would rarely be planted in vineyards, because their deep roots and large branches take much ground that would otherwise be used for the vines....

The fig tree was a common biblical symbol for Israel and may have that meaning here. More likely, the tree refers to a Gentile who has heard the gospel of Christ by faith in order to be saved. In either case, the parable reflects Jesus offering a chance for repentance and forgiveness of sin, showing his grace toward the faithful. "These three years" could logically refer the period it took for a fig tree to bear fruit, or allegorically, to the period of Jesus' ministry. The fig tree (Gentile) was given the time it needed to bear fruit, and the opportunity to be in the vineyard in the first place, where it otherwise would not have been. The vinedresser (Jesus) does not fail and promises to cultivate the tree so that it may produce fruit. In the end, the faithful prevail.

Luke could have based the allegory on a tale of a Jewish labourer 'outsmarting' his Roman master. The owner is an absentee landlord, only visiting his vineyard once a year. Jesus' Jewish audience would have understood that such a landlord might be unfamiliar with the Jewish law of first fruits, enunciated in Leviticus 19. This law forbade eating fruit from a tree in its first three years; while possibly intended to protect early growth, the law was to be taken literally. Therefore, the vinedresser, probably an observant Jew, may well have disposed of the fruit, either by plucking it at an unripe stage or dropping it for compost, to prevent anyone from inadvertently eating it during the tree's protected period. Now that the tree is entering its productive period, the vinedresser has saved it from the axe, without letting the master know what happened to the earlier fruit. (There may also be a suggestion that there is a period of latency in the development or manifestation of the results of good works).

And the vinedresser has another surprise for the Roman landlord: in the fourth year, all the fruit is to be offered to God! – Adapted from Wikipedia, "Parable of the barren fig tree"

LENTEN FAST & ABSTINENCE, ALMSGIVING, and PENANCE

- ABSTINENCE: Catholics aged 14+ are expected to abstain from meat on all Fridays of Lent¹ (and on Ash Wednesday). Eggs, fish, and plant-based substitutes don't count as meat.
- **FASTING:** Catholics aged 18-59 are expected to fast (taking at most one full meal and two small "snacks" that don't add up to a full meal) on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday and where possible, on Holy Saturday. Drinks such as water or juice don't count as food, but liquids used as food e.g., soups or smoothies do count.
- When you have a medical condition or are pregnant, travelling, or under unusual stress, these requirements may be relaxed.

In addition to fasting and abstinence, giving alms or doing charitable work is expected.

¹ Fridays are days of abstinence all year round, not just during Lent. *Outside* of Lent, however, special acts of charity or piety may be substituted for abstinence on these days.
